10: Jesus said to the Pharisees: ¹ 'Very truly, I tell you, anyone who does not enter the sheepfold by the gate but climbs in by another way is a thief and a bandit. ² The one who enters by the gate is the shepherd of the sheep. ³ The gatekeeper opens the gate for him, and the sheep hear his voice. He calls his own sheep by name and leads them out. 4 When he has brought out all his own, he goes ahead of them, and the sheep follow him because they know his voice. ⁵ They will not follow a stranger, but they will run from him because they do not know the voice of strangers.' 6 Jesus used this figure of speech with them, but they did not understand what he was saving to them. ⁷ So again Jesus said to them, 'Very truly, I tell you, I am the gate for the sheep. 8 All who came before me are thieves and bandits; but the sheep did not listen to them. 9 I am the gate. Whoever enters by me will be saved, and will come in and go out and find pasture. 10 The thief comes only to steal and kill and destroy. I came that they may have life, and have it abundantly.'

I am the gate for the sheep

Lock-down should mean that our homes are places of safety, though sadly for some in our parishes they are far from it. The sheepfold is a place of safety through the dark hours of the night.

In the Vicarage the cats keep us safe from mice and voles. W have had two offerings this week from the garden, which is fine when they are in plain sight, not so when they are left (caringly?) on a cushion half hidden by a blanket! At least they were dead, it's the ones that are still alive that cause he problems. One evening a mouse was brought to Ruth as she was chilling in the spare room. It escaped to hide under some bags of material. Fortunately it was found the next day in one of the bags having died from the tauma.

In Palestine, shepherds often sleep in the opening of the sheepfold, which is made out of a large circle of thick, high shrubbery. In this way, the shepherds both scare away the wolves and keep the sheep together: wolves smell their presence and are afraid to make midnight raids, while the sheep have no desire to walk over the shepherd to escape through the opening since they recognize him as a sign of security. When day finally dawns, the shepherd will rise and lead his sheep out to pasture. Thus the gate, the door to the sheep pen, symbolizes the complete attention and care given by a good shepherd. Christ chooses this image to teach us what he wants to be for each of us: everything.

A flock of sheep needs both protection and nourishment. The sheepfold provides the protection, and the fields provide the food and water. Without the sheepfold, they are vulnerable to attack as sheep are notoriously bad at self-defence, and without the pasture, they starve. When Jesus calls himself the "gate" for the sheep, he is claiming to provide us with everything we need, both the sheepfold and the pasture, and more than that showing us that this is God's nature to care and provide for those who trust in him.

Lord, I sometimes wonder why you don't give up on us. Shepherding should never be this hard.
We take the freedom that you have given us, nurtured so lovingly, and us it to rebel.

You would think the still waters of your presence the gift of green pastures, would be enough. But it only takes one sheep to get a stubborn thought and make a run for it, and we all follow as a flock. Crash headlong through the hedge of love you put there for our safety. Run bleating into trouble.

That must be hard Lord, to see your loving kindness thrown back at you in glib hypocrisy.

And yet the wonder is that you don't give up.

Your love goes on through everyone who tries to make this world a better place.

Your Spirit's compassion nudging us nearer to understanding, showing us the possibility and joy of reconciliation.

And, one day, Lord, when we are more amenable, perhaps we will find a way of fellowship to sit together at your table with all those you call your 'friends'. (Adapted from **Breaking the Rules** by Eddie Askew)
