The New Testament Reading - Acts 2 (The Voice Translation)

2:¹ Picture yourself among the disciples: A sound roars from the sky without warning, the roar of a violent wind, and the whole house where you are gathered reverberates with the sound.³ Then a flame appears, dividing into smaller flames and spreading from one person to the next. ⁴ All the people present are filled with the Holy Spirit and begin speaking in languages they've never spoken, as the Spirit empowers them. ⁵ Because of the holy festival, there are devout Jews staying as pilgrims in Jerusalem from every nation under the sun. ⁶ They hear the sound, and a crowd gathers. They are shocked and amazed because each of them can hear the group speaking in their native languages.

Pilgrims: Just a minute. Aren't all of these people Galileans? ⁸ How in the world do we all hear our native languages being spoken? ⁹ Look—there are Parthians here, and Medes, Elamites, Mesopotamians, and Judeans, residents of Cappadocia, Pontus, and Asia, ¹⁰ Phrygians and Pamphylians, Egyptians and Libyans from Cyrene, Romans including both Jews by birth and converts, ¹¹ Cretans, and Arabs. We're each, in our own languages, hearing these people talk about God's powerful deeds.

Pilgrims: What does this mean?

Skeptics: ¹³ It doesn't mean anything. They're all drunk on some fresh wine!

¹⁴ As the twelve stood together, Peter shouted to the crowd,

Peter: Men of Judea and all who are staying here in Jerusalem, listen. I want you to understand: ¹⁵ these people aren't drunk as you may think. Look, it's only nine o'clock in the morning! ¹⁶ No, this isn't drunkenness; this is the fulfilment of the prophecy of Joel. ¹⁷ Hear what God says! In the last days, I will offer My Spirit to humanity as a libation. Your children will boldly speak the word of the Lord. Young warriors will see visions, and your elders will dream dreams. ¹⁸ Yes, in those days I shall offer My Spirit to all servants, both male and female, and they will boldly speak My word.²¹ And everyone who calls on the name of the Lord will be liberated into God's freedom and peace.

The Rainbow of Hope.

One of the refreshing things about lock-down is the stillness. Our senses are no longer dulled by the background of traffic noise. Birdsong is loud and lovely, and over the past few days the smell of the sea has wafted into the vicarage garden when the tide has been low. There is a freshness in the air that will hopefully linger long after we find ourselves in the 'new normal'. While it may be a long and often frustrating wait, hope in these strange times has been symbolised by the rainbow. The rainbow is a sign of hope and renewal, but all too often the church get stuck in the upper -room, without really realising that the waiting is over and the promise of Pentecost is with us now. We act as if Pentecost is a bit like finding the end of the rainbow - a promise that always outside of our grasp.

Touching the rainbow. The disciples had already touched the rainbow with Jesus, sent out with the power to heal and to set free. They had been

touched and used by the Spirit to proclaim God's presence and love, but it was only transient. Here one moment and gone the next. As St. John reflects in today's Gospel, "as yet there was no Spirit, because Jesus was not yet glorified". We all can have those moments of close encounter with God, but all too soon they are gone like a fleeting shadow. All people can touch the rainbow, because the Spirit of God is the spirit of mission reaching out to draw all people to Jesus. community of faith and love. Touching the rainbow is not enough to follow Christ.

Living the rainbow. The disciples were together, and Jesus came and stood in the midst of them and said 'Peace be with you. As the Father has sent me, so I send you.' When he had said this, he breathed on them and said to them, 'Receive the Holy Spirit. If you forgive the sins of any, they are forgiven them; if you retain the sins of any, they are retained.' Their minds were opened to understand the scriptures, to be filled wiht the Spirit and taught to understand the calling the they had been given. They were enabled to begin to live the rainbow, but in the upper room, out of the world's gaze. It's a reminder that the presence of the Spirit can still be passive, still be hidden away. A private gift that defines the community of Christ, a presence that can be tamed and chained through ignorance and fear. Are we content to simply live the rainbow in a way that the world around will never see?

Being the rainbow. Pentecost brought the Spirit-filled faith of Jesus Christ into the open. Pentecost is anything but hidden, anything but half-hearted. Being the rainbow and living the promise means that we too are called to live our faith openly, gifted and empowered by the Spirit. It's a messy calling. It invites ridicule, from a sceptical society. As one commentator has remarked, "One of the lessons of Pentecost is that when "God happens," it is something astonishing, just like Pentecost itself. If we want to see some genuine "Acts of God" in our midst, we need to be prepared for some amazement, some confusion, some ridicule." Being the rainbow moves us out of the church and into the market place. Away from private faith and into public declaration.

So this Pentecost, even in the confines of lock-down, let us ask God to remove the limits to the life of the Spirit within us. Let us allow Him to enable us to be the rainbow of promise, and willingly, joyfully jump into the living water of the Spirit, as we offer a message of hope to a fearful and frustrated world.
